The Ohio Odonata Society is working with the Ohio Division of Wildlife to update the original survey that ran from 1991 – 2001. In this updated survey we will be utilizing both traditional collections of specimens and photographic records through <a href="Maturalist">iNaturalist</a>. The new survey will run from 2017 through 2019 and will culminate in a lay-person book on Ohio Dragonflies and Damselflies similar to the Ohio Bird Atlas.

Goals for the second survey of Ohio dragonflies and damselflies include:

- · to identify every species known for each county.
- to identify species introduced/established in Ohio since the original survey.
- to determine changes in distribution and abundance, especially rare species






#### Damselfly = Suborder Zygoptera

For beginners, it helps to look at the wing positioning and shape. Ohio has 51 species of damselflies in 3 families and 11 genera. Below is a quick silhouette guide for the common genera. Illustrations and design by MaLisa Spring.


